





In the days of exile and uncertainty, the prophet Isaiah cried out: "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence. As when fire sets twigs ablaze and causes water to boil, come down to make your name known to your enemies and cause the nations to quake before you! For when you did awesome things that we did not expect, you came down, and the mountains trembled before you." (Is 64:1-3)

In the midst of our own encounters with uncertainty and upheaval and our longing for deliverance, Jesus calls to us, "Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come" (Mark 13:35).

We wait as people surprised again and again by God who shakes us out of our complacency and wakes us up to the work of the kingdom all around us.

But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed.



In some of the darkest days of the Old Testament, the prophet Isaiah spoke of God turning the barren wilderness into a place of blessing where water and plants—and even pine trees—would manifest God's loving action to save and provide. God looks with favor upon those who find themselves in the wilderness of brokenness, hopelessness, and despair. We are called to lend our strength in bringing hope and shalom.

The Chrismon ornaments each reveal an aspect of Jesus' character: Jesus is Savior, shepherd, the source of our faith, hope, and love, ruler over all of creation, King of kings and Lord of lords. During this Advent season, familiarize yourself with the symbols and their meaning as we take our place in God's Kingdom.
