Meet New Member Holly Belcher *by Sara Blaha*

On Sunday afternoon, June 2, 2024, Holly and I sat in the Oak Grove Library and had a wonderful conversation about her relatively short life—well, it’s short compared to mine! But during our chat, I discovered we have a lot in common. We’re both Brethren (okay, that’s a given); we both love winter and snow (that was a surprise); we both have connections to Roanoke College (see below—I don’t mention I worked in the library there for 24 years); we both have men in our lives who are really into jazz; and perhaps most importantly, we both love dogs! (Her sweet girl is Emma.)



Holly Renee Belcher was born on January 25th during The Blizzard of ’96 (remember that?) at the hospital in Martinsville. She is the first-born child of Bennie and Michele Belcher. Her brother Eric arrived six years later. The family lives in the valley near Woolwine in Patrick County which is about 34 miles west of Martinsville. Her grandmothers, aunts, uncles and cousins lived nearby, so she always had playmates ready, willing, and able to hang out and have lots of fun together. It meant/means a lot to Holly to have that close family connection.

Holly’s mom is an elementary school teaching assistant. This past year she had first graders. And here's something I learned about Holly’s dad that put a smile on my face. He’s a mechanic/machinist for the Wood Brothers Racing organization. That’s right; he works with NASCAR! I googled them when I got home. Wood Brothers Racing holds the Guinness World Record for the longest active NASCAR racing team. They’re the oldest continuously operating NASCAR Cup Series team, and they’ve always raced Ford cars (which probably explains why Holly is a “Ford girl”). Holly’s dad helped build several scale model racing cars that are in the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, Michigan.

Holly attended elementary school K-7 and high school 8-12. Patrick County High School was one of the first schools in the commonwealth to offer two years of college in high school, and Holly chose to participate in that program. Understandably, it meant she and the other ten participating classmates would need to take more classes and study a lot harder. But all that hard work paid off; she was able to enter college as a junior and finish in two years.

For years, Holly knew she wanted to be a Virginia Tech Hokie. But God had other plans for her. The necessary paperwork did not make it to Tech on time. She wasn’t denied admission; they just didn’t have everything they needed to accept her for the fall of 2014. Luckily, Roanoke College was a backup and they accepted her as a transfer student. Holly and her mom toured the campus and she fell in love with it. Her friendly, outgoing personality was noticed by President Mike Maxey. In the fall, even after graduation, she would take boxes of apples to him, something he always looked forward to with pleasure.

Since graduating from Roanoke College in 2016 (I was in the band for her commencement ceremony), Holly has worked as a paralegal at various law firms in the Roanoke Valley. She loves what she does and most enjoys working with criminal law cases. She is considering law school (the LSAT is done) but isn't in a hurry to go there. I'm confident, should she make the decision to follow that dream, she'll blossom into a fabulous attorney.

And now for the *really* good stuff.

When Holly was in second grade, she made the decision to dedicate her life to Christ and was baptized at Smith River Church of the Brethren, her family's church for many years. In my view, it's both astounding and impressive that she could make that important decision at such a young age. During our conversation in the Library, I was taken by her understanding of God's grace, her confidence in it, and her devotion to living a good life that would make him proud.

Her decision was not easy. She cried—a lot. Her pastor told her, “This is your decision to make when you're ready. No one will make you do this.” The next Sunday, the call to the altar was a song that had been played at her great grandmother's funeral a few months earlier. According to Holly, “It just felt right. Every day since then has been different. I've known a long time about God's power. As I got older, I learned about the things that really matter and the things that don't.” Later in our conversation about her grandfather's death—she had a premonition about that, or maybe it was God's whisper—Holly said, “It reminded me that the church is pure. If I hadn't accepted God years before, I would not have known about all this. I never regretted anything. I am reminded how amazing God's grace is. Listen to it, what He's telling you. It's breathtaking, what he can do for you.”

After Holly graduated from Roanoke College, she set out to find a church in the Roanoke area. She knew Tim and Lynette Harvey from their time at New Hope CoB in Stuart, and in fact, their daughter Emily (who is just six weeks younger than Holly) was/is a good friend. The girls were in the same kindergarten, first and second grade classes, and they also enjoyed their time at Camp Bethel together.

And here's something I really loved hearing. When Holly first started attending Oak Grove, Alton and Mildred Hipps (Carol Elmore's parents) were still with us. One Sunday, they approached Holly and asked, “Would you like to have lunch with us?” She thought about it for a second, then said, “Okay, why not.” They went to lunch and had a wonderful time. “They were great people. I'm not sure I would have had that experience if I'd gone to a different church. Oak Grove is a very special place. I feel very at home here. It's like it was growing up in my church at home. I felt welcomed as I joined the church in May 2024. I can count on people here.”

So, seek out Holly on Sunday morning. Take time to get to know this special young woman. And maybe invite her to lunch. I bet she'll say, “Okay, why not!”

Pastor's Column

Some years ago, I came across a helpful way of categorizing congregational outreach into *charity*, *service*, and *justice* ministries. I have found these categories to be a helpful framework for us to think about the many ways a congregation can engage the needs of people in our community.

Charity describes programs where one person or group meets another person's need. Paying a utility bill, offering a bag of groceries, or providing a night in the Rescue Mission are illustrations. The strengths of charitable outreach are that many people offer contributions that address an immediate crisis. Some drawbacks are that charity does little to impact long-term needs and is almost exclusively one-directional, offering little opportunity for relationship building.

Service opportunities are those where relationship happens and our understanding of the community begins to expand. When we work together with people we're helping—through ministries like Brethren Disaster Ministries or Habitat for Humanity—we can build relationships to address both immediate and long-term needs.

Justice ministries address the larger, systemic issues that leave people in difficult or desperate situations. To borrow from Bishop Desmond Tutu's famous quote, justice ministries are those that "prevent people from being pushed into the river" in the first place. The work is long, slow, and far removed from the individuals involved, working instead at the policy or program level. A seat on a board of directors or serving on a civic commission are examples of justice ministry.

Over the last several years, our congregation has maintained a significant number of charity-type mission engagements while also expanding mission work into the service and justice areas. Much of this has come through programs that seek to educate people on racism and gun violence. These include:

Oak Grove members Ellen Phillips and Randall Eakin serve on the Virgina District Race Education Team. That group has sponsored book studies and other educational events that teach people about the true nature and form of racism.

A new ministry in Roanoke is *Roanoke Justice Ministries*. Led by Ray Higgins, a local, trained, community organizer, RJM is seeking to build a 500 – 1000-member coalition of concerned Christians who will then lobby city leaders to fund an as yet to be determined need. Led mostly by clergy from the NW part of our city, our first large meeting gathered approximately 50 concerned church members, Black and white, from across the city. Pastor Tim and Deanna Knox have joined in meetings with this group.

Ellen Phillips and Deanna Knox also work with the *Roanoke Reparations Group*, a coalition of church members initiated by Central Church of the Brethren. The group's next project is a summer book study of Robert Turner's book, *Creating a Culture of Repair*.

Pastor Tim continues to serve on the Gun Violence Prevention Commission in Roanoke. Among other things, we have come to know the work of FEDUP through this connection. Pastor Tim and Lynette, along with Sylvia Shepherd and Deanna Knox, recently attended FEDUP’s annual prayer breakfast.

Having many church members engaged in a wide range of mission and outreach is like a good potluck meal: there truly is “something for everyone” with this model. How do you participate in the wide offerings of mission and outreach opportunities in our congregation? In what ways would you like to learn more?

From Sleep in Heavenly Peace Roanoke Chapter:



From January to the present, we made 140 deliveries and delivered 255 beds. Overall, in 4 1/2 years, this chapter is responsible for delivering 1,587 beds!

Over the past year, our *Strategic Task Team* (Connie Bierly, Tim Harvey, Horace Light, Sam Phillips, Todd Marcum, Marc Wilson, and Alli Yingling) has taken a close look at our congregation’s financial stewardship. This includes the creation of a new endowment: the *Oak Grove Acorn Fund*. The *Acorn Fund* is designated by the Church Board to supplement the annual church budget by funding program and/or salaries at the Board’s discretion, in consultation with the Finance Commission. In cases where the church’s finances are sufficient to cover the ministry and program of the congregation, special consideration for funding new mission and ministry projects would be considered. Capital improvement and maintenance needs will not be covered by this fund.



This fund begins with a balance of approximately \$40,000, which comes from budget surplus, special funds, and last fall’s Quilt Auction. It will take time to build up a balance sufficient to fund any ministry or program needs. Oak Grove members are encouraged to remember this fund through their regular giving and their estate planning.
