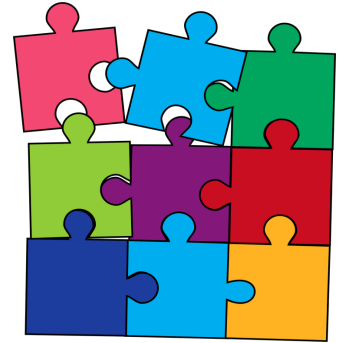

Topics discussed at our July 2026 monthly meeting include:

All commissions/committees will begin planning for the 2027 Budget at their upcoming August meetings. The finalized, proposed 2027 budget is scheduled for members' vote at Council Meeting on October 18.

Pastor Tim continues to stay very busy coordinating activities with all our commissions. As usual, his work with Annual Conference has taken a significant amount of time and planning. He is currently working on his "summer" task list. This includes stewardship plans, closely working with financial plans, plans for August sermon series on "Finding God in Music", and plans for advent. All this in addition to his pastoral care work with all of us.

Minister of Nature and Music also continues to stay very busy. Carol served as one of our delegates to annual conference. Mike Elmore served as our second delegate this year. After returning from Annual Conference, Carol coordinated and chaperoned (along with Todd Marcum and Kirsten Lubbs-Robinson) FaithX, a summer youth work camp where four of our youth (Maddie Burton, Charleigh Jackson, Davion Jackson, Graeme Robinson) gained valuable experience working with adults with special needs. Following the work camp, Carol (along with Don Pizzulo) and two of our young people (Gavin Robinson and Vincent Pizzullo) took off to National Youth Conference (NYC). Carol continues to work very closely with our Christian Education Commission on upcoming Vacation Bible School, and will be working to organize concerts for our congregation to enjoy, and with special music for the August sermon series. And remember in addition to all this great work, she has the additional task of serving as moderator-elect for our District Conference coming up this fall.

Christian Education Commission continues the process of hiring one person to help with children from ages infant to third grade each Sunday from 9:30 to 12:30 with payment of \$100 per Sunday. Two applicants are expected to be interviewed in the very near future. Vacation Bible School registration is now open. Good as Gold certificates are available. Watch for details on newer changing tables and possible décor for the nursery. Plans to purchase children's books from The Brethren Press are being made. These books will be given to families quarterly. Money currently in the Gladis Lehman Memorial Fund will be used to begin this program.

Evangelism and Membership has chosen the two organizations to receive a \$100 gift each in honor of Mothers' Day and Fathers' Day: The Bradley Free Clinic and Fed Up. They are also working on activities to be a part of the fall Church Bazaar and may plan another Guess Who's Coming to Lunch for the fall. Serving in their role as Nominating Committee, this commission will begin planning our 2027 slate. In addition to these annual tasks, this commission will take the lead in planning for our 125th anniversary coming up in 2027.

Finance Commission a monthly careful review of the overall financial health of our congregation continues. This includes working to transition some bookkeeping, financial reporting, and payroll tasks to Neely's Accounting. The commission has decided that three positions will serve as authorized contacts on financial accounts: finance chair, treasurer, and a trustee. These positions are currently held by Carolyn Morris, Shelly Haas, and Todd Marcum respectively. The Leadership Team was provided several financial statements for their review. Pastor Tim noted that for the first time in recent years our June 30th Statement of Financial Position shows a net operating revenue of \$1,231.94. This is good news; often times at the mid-year point we operate at a net loss. Giving has often been lower than normal during summer months and more robust other times of the year. Nelson Hylton and Becky Fowler served on this year's financial review committee and have completed their work. The 2025 Year End Statement of Financial Position shows a net operating loss of \$10,189.65. Copies of financial statements are available upon request.

Ministry and Worship ensured our pulpit was filled each Sunday during Pastor Tim's time away for vacation and Annual Conference needs. Roger Stultz, Greg Broyles, and Marilyn Lerch served as guest preachers. Year round this commission supports the work of our head usher, audio visual volunteers, church decorators, and music team.

Missions & Service reports the successful dispensing with our very unwelcome visitors in the kitchen. More stringent cleaning protocols remain in place and need to be followed by anyone using the kitchen. Details for our August 1 picnic at Camp Bethel will be finalized by the printing of this newsletter. The commission is also discussing plans for fall activities which may include a back-to-school pancake breakfast, a Sleep in Heavenly Peace Bed Build & Luncheon, a cobbler booth for Heritage Day at Camp Bethel, and the CROP Walk in October. They will also work to coordinate our potluck luncheon for our Fall Council Meeting.

Peace and Justice asks that everyone mark their calendars to come to church on September 1 at 6 p.m. to learn more details on Roanoke Justice Ministries and how we might be supportive of this ecumenical social justice ministry.

Property Commission The parsonage rent increased July 1. The current tenants' new house isn't yet completed so they are on a month-to-month rental agreement at the increased rate. Some of the new furniture for our vestibule has been delivered and placed. Upgrades to HVAC in the vestibule have been completed. A new commercial refrigerator has been purchased and installed in the kitchen. The flooring contractor notified us that all the new flooring in the fellowship hall, vestibule, and front entrance will be replaced **at his expense** due to some of the flooring coming loose.

The Deacon Board did not meet in July. At the next meeting, the deacons plan to discuss revisioning of the current card list, updating our shepherding list, and finalizing plans for the next Love Feast. For World Communion Sunday on October 4, we will likely schedule bread and cup communion. We will also be brainstorming ideas for the deacons to take on for our 125th anniversary.

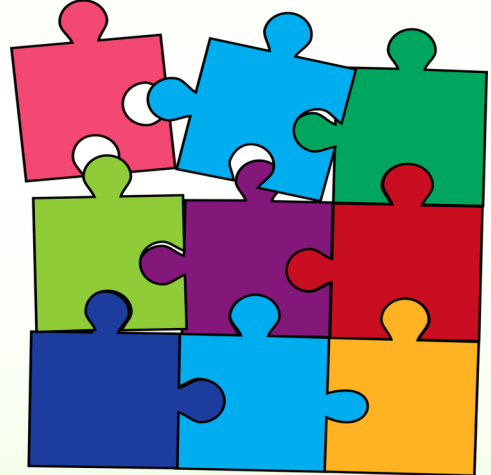

Annual Conference Wrap-up

Annual Conference by the numbers

- **1,659 registered participants** including 389 delegates, 1,117 nondelegates, and 153 virtual attendees.
- **\$50,788.29 received in five worship offerings:**
 - ◇ \$9,409.70 received for Core Ministries of the Church of the Brethren, with a focus on Global Mission.
 - ◇ \$14,268.05 received in support of Annual Conference operations on Monday, June 29
 - ◇ \$11,350.63 received for the Witness to Host City benefiting Alive Community Outreach (with an additional 4 pallets of material goods also donated).
 - ◇ \$10,066.59 received for Annual Conference children and youth programming
 - ◇ \$5,693.32 received in support of the Church of the Brethren Core Ministries with a focus on Discipleship and Leadership Formation.
- **\$14,759 was raised by the Silent Auction** to undergird the operating budget of Annual Conference. Items included two delightful sets of crocheted Winnie the Pool characters from Sarah Ann Bowman, a cutting board from Pastor Tim, and a Noah's Ark by Hobert Harvey.
- **1 new fellowship and 1 new church plant were welcomed** into the Church of the Brethren denomination: Iglesia Cristiana Elohim was welcomed as a new fellowship located in Las Vegas, Nev., in Pacific Southwest District. The Sanctuary was welcomed as a new church plant located in a rural area of Indiana, in Northern Indiana District.
- **A 4.2 percent cost of living increase** was approved for the Minimum Cash Salary Table for Pastors in 2027, as proposed by the Pastoral Compensation and Benefits Advisory Committee.
- **110 units of blood** were collected over 2 days onsite. The Annual Conference Virtual Blood Drive, in which church members and friends can give blood in their own communities, continues through July 31. Pastor's Column for August 2026

Finding God in the Music 2026

"Light in the Shadows"

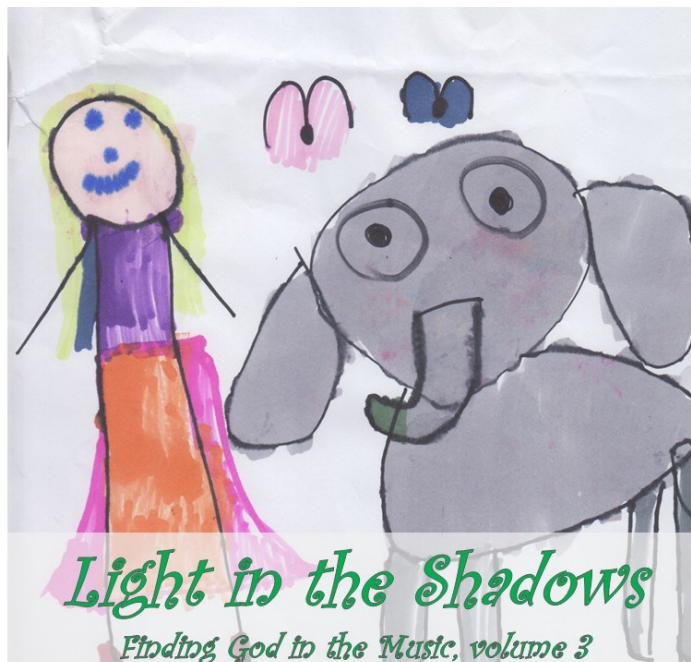
As you enter the sanctuary on Sunday, August 2, pause for a moment to notice the parament on the pulpit. Its color reminds us that we have entered a liturgical season that offers a new invitation to listen for God's presence in our lives.

Finding God in the Music returns this year with an eclectic collection of songs whose melodies and metaphors encourage us to lift our eyes beyond the pressures of each day. Together, they invite us to rediscover the people, places, and moments that bear witness to God's grace, helping us rejoice in life's blessings even amid its challenges and hardships. The Hooters' 2008 song "I'm Alive!" comes from their album *Time Stand Still*. Although the band is best known for its 1980s pop hits, a deeper listen reveals lyrical themes shaped by the members' Jewish upbringing. "I'm Alive!" offers a simple but easily overlooked invitation: be grateful for the gift of today.

"Crooked Tree" is the title track from the 2022 album by Molly Tuttle and Golden Highway. If dazzling guitar work is your preferred musical style, few musicians can match Molly Tuttle's speed, precision, and beauty on the fretboard. This song also pairs naturally with our *Sermon on the Mount* series, as Matthew 7:15–20 contrasts trees that bear good fruit with those that do not. As we'll discover, there are advantages to being a "crooked tree."

The power of Balsam Range's "Eldorado Blue" lies in its lyrical simplicity, inviting us to recognize the value of the ordinary gifts already before us. Can we learn to find contentment right where we are?

Ghost Hounds make their first *Finding God in the Music* appearance with their 2021 song “Mountain Range.” Its lyrics lead us into the woods on a rainy day, where nature becomes a place of spiritual clarity and renewal. Where do you go to find rest from the noise of everyday life?

If you had told me when I entered ministry 30 years ago that I would one day preach a sermon beginning with the words, “I want you to consider this gospel song written by The Rolling Stones,” I would have laughed out loud. Yet here we are with their 2023 song “Sweet Sounds of Heaven,” featuring Lady Gaga. Rather than saying more about why I chose it, I’ll simply encourage you to listen. It practically preaches its own sermon.

Finding God in the Music is an annual reminder that the Spirit often meets people on familiar ground, speaking through melodies already in their ears and stories already in their hearts. Like the Apostle Paul, who stood in Athens and quoted the poets his listeners already knew, we seek to build bridges that lead toward Christ. We pray that those who hear these songs might also hear the deeper invitation beneath them—that, like Dionysius, Damaris, and the others who believed, they may discover that the God they have been searching for has been nearer than they imagined all along. May it be so in our day.

Second L.E.A.D. Conference held at Ephrata

Hebrews 11:8 was the theme of the second Church of the Brethren

L.E.A.D. Conference held at Ephrata (Pa.) Church of the Brethren on May 1-3, organized by the denomination's Discipleship and Leadership Formation staff. Attendance included 112 people in person and 8 online.

Michaela Alphonse, pastor of Miami (Fla.) First Church of the Brethren, opened the gathering with a challenging sermon reflecting on the need for church leaders to obey God, no matter the cost.

A wide variety of workshops were held in three languages—English, Spanish, and Haitian Creole—with leadership from more than 20 presenters from across the Church of the Brethren.

Three keynote messages by Tod Bolsinger expounded on the concept of following God's Spirit into unknown places and situations. An author, professor, and former pastor, Bolsinger drew

on illustrations from scripture and from history to describe how the church in North America in 2026 finds itself in uncharted territory.

"What got us here won't get us there," was his common refrain, meaning that the landscape of the culture has

shifted and Christianity is not the dominant influence it once was. Bolsinger noted that relying on old methods and patterns that served the church well in the past may not be as effective in sharing the unchanging Gospel within our rapidly changing world.

Global Church of the Brethren Communion meets in Spain

After many meetings on Zoom with the delegates and alternates, the Global Church of the Brethren Communion met in person on Spain's northern coast in April. The last in-person meeting of the communion was in 2022 in the Dominican Republic. A number of representatives did not get visas to enter Spain, so a Zoom connection was provided for those who could join online.

The Gijón congregation of Iglesia Una Luz En Las Naciones, where pastor Santos Terrero started his ministry 20

years ago, hosted the meeting. He serves as president of the Global Church of the Brethren Communion.

Each day began with a time of devotions and prayer led by various countries. "State of the church in action" reports were shared and topical sessions were held around a theme from Acts 4: "The authority of the church in the face of opposition."

To ground the assembly in shared history and theological heritage, secretary Alexandre Gonçalves traced the development of the communion by naming the "five pillars" of its global vision:

- Affirming autonomy
- Embracing indigenous churches
- Mutual sharing of resources
- Practicing servant leadership
- Sharing core Brethren values while respecting cultural differences

The communion voted unanimously to accept the Church of the Brethren in Burundi into the global fellowship. The group also heard updates on contacts with house churches in Cuba and interest from Iglesia de Los Hermanos Comunidad de Fe of the Dominican Republic.

\$500,000 grant supports Brethren Disaster Ministries

The Church of the Brethren has been awarded a half-million dollar grant to support Brethren Disaster Ministries. The grant was received from Lilly Endowment Inc. through its initiative, "Hope After the Storm: Capacity Building for Faith-Based Disaster Relief Organizations." It will support "a three-year program expansion and improvements to US-based programs," said Roy Winter, executive director of Service Ministries.

The grant will support Brethren Disaster Ministries goals of strengthening US programs and increasing volunteer participation. To expand, the program needs more volunteers to support children after disasters, rebuild homes, and provide onsite leadership, and needs to update systems, communications, and tools to increase volunteer recruitment and participation. The funds also help purchase two new vans.

Winter emphasized that continued financial support of Brethren Disaster Ministries programs will be important during the three-year grant cycle, as the grant does not fund normal operations.

Legal and Mutual Aid Fund reaches goal of \$250,000

The Deportation Defense Response team has announced that its Legal and Mutual Aid Fund achieved a goal of raising \$250,000 by Easter weekend. The fund aids church members affected by immigration enforcement. As of April, more than 95 grants had been distributed via more than 30 congregations. A new goal has been set to raise \$400,000.

Madalyn Metzger and **Rhonda Pittman Gingrich** have been named to new interim leadership positions on the denominational staff following the retirement announcement of Wendy McFadden, longterm publisher of Brethren Press and executive director of Communications.

Madalyn Metzger on June 15 began as part-time interim executive director of Engagement and Communications, moving to fulltime July 13. She will lead Communications and Mission Advancement. She was moderator of the 2024 Annual Confer-

ence and has had a lifelong involvement with the Church of the Brethren. Most recently she has been chief marketing officer at Everence. She will work remotely from northern Indiana and be onsite regularly at the General Offices in Elgin, Ill.

Rhonda Pittman Gingrich begins in August as part-time interim leader of Brethren Press, in addition to her work as director of Annual Conference. She will provide leadership in a time of discernment of how Brethren Press may best be supported moving forward. Her responsibilities for Annual Conference will be shared by Debbie

Noffsinger, Conference assistant, who has transitioned from part-time to full-time.

Michelle Martinez began April 27 as manager of Accounting and assistant treasurer at the Church of the Brethren General Offices. She is a graduate of the University of Phoenix with a bachelor of science in accounting and a master's in business administration. Previously, she worked at the Village of Niles, Ill., as senior accountant manager.

Adam Lane began May 27 as program assistant for Children's Disaster Services at the Brethren Service Center in

New Windsor, Md. He is a graduate of Huntington University with a bachelor's in Worship Leadership and of Bethany Seminary with a master of arts in Spiritual and Social Transformation. He and his family are members at Beaver Creek Church of the Brethren in Hagerstown, Md.

Gaston Pierre-Louis has joined the Part Time Pastor; Full Time Church program of the Ministry Office as a circuit rider. He will fill in after Founa A. Badet, director of Intercultural Ministries, steps down as a circuit rider effective July 31.
